- Schools use Airbnb-type services to earn money, renting out spaces from classrooms to canteens, holding puppy training in their car parks and wrestling competitions in their gyms. One state school said it made over £700,000 last year.
- 2 Schools typically advertise through online sites like Sharesy. One primary school in Brent has made £21,800 this year and expects more than £25,000 by the end of 2023.
- 3 Although they aren't real businesses, schools are looking for ways to make money and "are becoming increasingly innovative," said Felix Atkin, founder and CEO of Sharesy.
- 4 Special-needs schools are "particularly popular to rent out for children's parties", and schools can earn "up to £300 a party," Atkin said. "We also have schools that rent out their car parks at the weekends for puppy training and food markets."
- 5 In England, budgets were reduced even more in October after the government took away £370 million from money schools had been promised in July.
- 6 However, some communities complained after their local schools started selling advertising space inside and on the sides of their buildings.
- 7 Brandon Bennett from School Space said schools held many different activities. "The film and TV industry particularly are always looking for interesting spaces that match the script they're working on."
- 8 On average, schools using School Space make £88,800 yearly, with their biggest making £228,199 this year. "We see an average increase in income of 170 per cent in the first six months of handling lettings for schools," he said.
- 9 Ann Flaherty, the director of Solar for Schools, said that schools welcome the help from the extra money. She said the schools "tell me they spend the money on stationery and books."

- 10 Renting out school car parks on sites such as YourParkingSpace and JustPark is also popular because many schools are close to sporting and entertainment events. The prices at one college in Oxford are less than the council and shopping centre for weekend parking.
- 11 Charlie Gothold from SchoolHire said that the only limit is having enough staff to manage the rentals and be there when bookings occur. He said the schools "need someone doing the admin, and someone has to be there to open and close the premises and make sure the people renting the space are behaving."
